Summer 2020 – Present – STORIES FROM THE FUTURE: Crisis as Catalyst for Carbon Neutrality: I am working alongside Lisa Pettibone to co-facilitate a workshop series that brings together participants – researchers, artists, activists – from around the world to discuss the potential for stories and artifacts from ‘the future’ to effect change in the present regarding climate change and carbon neutrality. The workshop centers BIPOC voices and ideas and is part of ACUD Macht Neu’s (Berlin, DE) *Collective Practices* project, which aims to create and build knowledge collaboratively through intentional solidarity work and praxis.

Spring 2017 – Present – Not Afraid of the Ruins: Since 2017, I have been a contributing editor for the Not Afraid of the Ruins, a blog (and forthcoming anthology book) that explores intersection of science & technology, environmental & climate justice, and possibilities for a post-capitalist future through critical essays and speculative fiction. The project is a collective endeavor with editors based in five countries.

Fall 2019/Spring 2020* – I am designing and co-leading a pilot program between the Edmund Burke School in Washington D.C. and Experience Learning in Circleville, WV. I am working with teachers to build the 11th grade curriculum at Edmund Burke around understanding issues of extraction, natural resources, labor, and justice in Appalachia, which will culminate in a week-long program to Experience Learning that I will facilitate and lead. The aim is to cultivate sustained relationships between students in DC with students in WV and to draw meaningful connections between upstream communities in WV with downstream communities in DC.

June-Sept. 2013; March-Aug. 2015 – Resident Instructor, The Mountain Institute

As a resident instructor, I was responsible for teaching outdoor education courses on topics ranging from local ecology to natural resource management. The courses usually ran between 4 – 10 days in the field, where I was responsible for the group's health and safety as well as their education experience. Additionally, I helped manage the Spruce Knob Mountain Center facility, worked with their solar campaign, wrote articles for the Center's newsletter, and lived in a yurt.

Aug. 2012 – Feb. 2013 – Researcher/Coordinator, The Bolivian Mountain Institute

During my time with the BMI, I conducted research, helped organize data, wrote grant and project proposals, and worked as a freelance reporter for English and Spanish speaking media outlets. Most of the research focused on measuring the retreat of Bolivia's rapidly melting glaciers. My research examined the intersections of race, class, and climate change among Bolivia's indigenous Kallawayá healers. As a freelance reporter, I covered the initial rumblings of the increasingly difficult mining protests that are linked to the country's nationalization of its mining resources. I also covered climate change and its impact on Bolivian society more broadly.

June–Aug. 2011, PUPUK (Association for the Advance of Small Businesses)

I was one of ten U.S. students selected nationally for the Freeman Indonesia Nonprofit Internship Program. I was responsible for learning how NGOs worked in the developing world as opposed to the role they play in the U.S. My duties included streamlining PUPUK's website, helping conduct field interviews, and grant writing. Additionally, my internship partner and I helped draft a new social entrepreneurship program, which was later approved by their board and put into effect. I was also able to help set up some strategic partnerships between PUPUK and organizations in the U.S.

During Summer 2010, I traveled to Northern India to volunteer and conduct research among Tibetan former political prisoners. In addition to my research, I volunteered for a local library, an environmental awareness program, and taught English at Gu Chu Sum.
